Differences between the two

• NZ Road Code



No-passing line

As shown in the image above:

- you may come back over the dashed yellow line between A and B to finish passing
- you must not cross the solid yellow line between C and D.

You can pass at a no-passing line if:

- you stay on your side of the solid yellow line, and
- you can see 100 metres of clear road in front of you for the whole time while you are passing, and
- the lane is wide enough for two vehicles.

Land Transport Act + Rules

"2.9 Passing where roadway marked with no-passing line

(2) The driver must not pass or attempt to pass a motor vehicle or an animaldrawn vehicle moving in the same direction within the length of roadway on which the no-passing line is marked until the driver reaches the further end of the no-passing line, unless throughout the passing movement the driver keeps the vehicle wholly to the left of the nopassing line."

Differences between the two

NZ Road Code

Safe driving around cyclists

- Hazards like parked cars, potholes, glass, litter, strong wind and opening car doors may cause cyclists to veer off-line and move into your path. Because of this, give cyclists plenty of room when passing them. Ideally, allow at least 1.5 metres between you and the cyclist.
- Wait for a clear space before passing a cyclist on a narrow road.
- At intersections, apply the same rules to cyclists that you would to any other vehicle on the road. Take care to indicate turns.
- If you are crossing a cycle lane, give way to cyclists before you cross.
- Take extra care around young cyclists.

STRAD/

- You must not drive in or cross a cycle lane except for a maximum of 50 metres when entering or leaving side roads, driveways or parking spaces.
- You must not stop, stand or park in a cycle lane.



Land Transport Act + Rules

"2.6 General requirements about passing other vehicles

(1) A driver must not pass or attempt to pass another vehicle moving in the same direction unless—

(a) the movement can be <mark>made with </mark> <mark>safety</mark>; and

(b) the movement is made with due consideration for other users of the road"

Possible new Road Rule changes

"Accessible Streets" legislation package:

https://www.nzta.govt.nz/about-us/consultations/archive/accessible-streets/

- New categories: "powered/unpowered trpt devices"
 - Can use cycle lanes/paths along with bikes
- Minimum overtaking gap when passing bikes
- Biking on footpaths (For all? Kids <16?)
 - With rules around behaviour (eg max speeds)
- Changes to road rules when cycling

ASTRADA

- Passing on the left, Going straight from a left-turn lane
- Separated cycleways as "roadway" (priority over turning traffic)
- Creation of "path crossing" treatments at sideroads
