

Chch earthquakes - Aftermath




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- Major damage (est. \$40 billion rebuild) (and 185 deaths)
 - 70% of city centre demolished/rebuilt
 - 15,000-20,000 residential properties rebuilt
 - Over 100,000 other properties repaired
 - 45% of Christchurch's roads rebuilt about 1000 km

Panic buying of supplies



People urged not to panic buy petrol

Oil companies are urging Christchurch people not to panic buy petrol, saying there is plenty of supply. Shell, BP and Caltex have all reopened some of their sites in the city following Tuesday's devastating quake, but say people

are unnecessarily panic-buying, fearing that stocks will run out.

In some cases, service stations have had to close or restrict their supply to emergency vehicles. A queue for a petrol station in New Brighton stretched for 1km on Thursday, even though the station is closed due to the

Oil companies say stocks are running low because of an unnecessary run on petrol - not because of a shortage of supply -

The companies say the BP fuel terminal in Lyttelton reopened on Thursday and another is expected to open on Friday.

In the meantime, oil companies are trucking fuel to Christchurch from Timaru which has no shortage of stocks.



Site-sharing gives schools fresh ideas

Some Christchurch secondary schools are considering changing their timetables after site-sharing has uncovered a new way of operating.

More than 20 schools have shared sites since the February quake. While some schools have returned to their home bases, 12 will still be sharing sites next term.

Schools have had to condense their day, with some taking the morning shift and others the afternoon shift. This has seen pupils lose an hour of teaching time a day.

Core Education research director Vince Ham said the negative aspects of site-sharing were obvious, but the experience had also revealed some positives.

Core Education, a not-for-profit educational research and development organisation, has been commissioned by the Education Ministry to conduct a study on the impact co-location and relocation has had on teachers, pupils and their families. The study will be released in October.

Some unexpected benefits of site-sharing had already been uncovered, Ham said. "It's not all doom and gloom."

At least three schools were reviewing their timetable and asking for narental feedback after seeing how different timetables had worked






CERA Plan - "An Accessible City"



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- The Canterbury earthquakes identified many valuable lessons for transport planning
 - What worked well and also what not to do Other areas with similar disasters should take note
- Some learnings can/should be heeded in advance of any disasters happening
- Transitional nature of transport networks post-disaster is an opportunity
 - Allows for experimentation that is difficult to do otherwise (esp. with traditional consultation)
